Sajjad, Shining Light



As I write this, I have just come off a call with Sajjad, the leader of Shining Light, our partners in Pakistan. He explained to me that the key to their approach in the remote mountain villages is 'go slow, go long.'

Shining Light's work in these villages focusses on community development and requires patient trust-building over many years. Sanaya's story (pages 3-4) is an amazing testament of how effective the 'go slow, go long' process has been in her village.

A few years ago, Sanaya and her family struggled financially. Despite her desire to help, her family didn't look to her for assistance because she was a woman. Without opportunities to learn new skills, it was difficult for Sanaya to know what to do.

### Updates from around the world



### CHAD: Baby Bintou grows healthy and strong

At one month old, little Bintou was struggling to gain weight. Her mother tragically passed away following complications at birth and without formula milk, Bintou was not getting the nutrients and sustenance to survive.

Her weight dropped to 2.23kg and her concerned grandmother decided to make the 40km journey to our partner's centre in order to get some help. Over four months, Bintou and her grandmother receive the care and training they needed. Bintou finally reached a healthy weight and they were able to return home.

Your support is enabling our partners in Chad to care for more orphans and provide training for their carers so vulnerable children can have a healthy start in life. Thank you.

#### **KENYA: New Spark Projects**

In Western Kenya, 16 families have received your Spark investment and are starting to set up their businesses. Our partners share that a large number of the families are opening shops, others have used the funding for agricultural enterprises, and some are doing hairdressing to earn an income.

All the families are parents or grandparents of children with disabilities and who qualified for free treatment by our partners, Dreamland Mission Hospital.

We are overjoyed that God continues to be at work in these families, and that the gifts He has given each of them are starting to be used to help improve their standard of living. Thank you for supporting this transformative work.



Our **Next Generation Projects** help overlooked communities lift themselves out of the feelings of shame and powerlessness caused by disadvantage and material poverty. Together we open doors of possibility so they can discover their true worth in Christ and unlock their God-given potential.

As their potential is unlocked, they become empowered to form ideas to provide for themselves. Our **Spark Projects** offer short-term investments so they can turn their ideas into reality and begin building sustainable livelihoods.



### Sanaya's Journey of Possibility

For the first time, I have confidence in myself and my family trusts me in my abilities. 99

Nestled in the majestic mountain range of Northern Pakistan, you can hear the steady thrum of sewing machines being spun. Weaving in between the beat is the sound of gentle chatter and peals of laughter.

Sanaya\* is making a dress in her tailoring shop, and her family is helping her with clients who have come to order some new clothes.

Much has changed for Sanaya and her family. A few years ago, they were struggling to earn enough to provide for themselves. Sanaya wanted to help, but with limited skills and a lack of belief from her family, she felt stuck.

Now, thanks to your support and Sanaya's tenacity, she is building a better life for herself and her family.

In the remote villages of Gilgit, women have been raised with restrictive traditions, where many do not have a voice in their community and are often overlooked in their efforts and responsibilities.

We believe these women should feel cherished and celebrated for their gifts and contributions.

Our local partner, Shining Light, comes alongside these communities with our Next Generation Project to provide training for women in tailoring skills. Through this training, the women begin to recognise their worth and become economically active. It also encourages the villages to see the value that the women bring to their community.

#### **Untapped potential**

Sanaya grew up in a family that faced severe financial challenges. Although Sanaya was eager to help, her family did not look to her because she is a woman. Her potential was underestimated, and without opportunities to gain new skills, it was difficult for Sanaya to know how she could change the situation.

#### Learning to sew

After many years of relationship building by Shining Light, our partners were able to set up our Next Generation Project in Sanaya's village in 2022. She asked her parents for permission to join the tailoring course and was able to get a place.

The trainers quickly noticed Sanaya's skill in stitching and also her determination. She enjoyed learning to sew and creating garments so much that she said, "Sometimes in my sleep, I would dream about stitching."

Due to her skill, Sanaya was invited to enrol in the advanced course in the town of Gilgit. There, her newfound confidence solidified, and her tailoring skills continued to improve.





#### Support from her family

By the end of the courses, Sanaya's parents had changed their perceptions of their daughter and her capabilities. They now have a huge respect for her and can see her gift in tailoring.

Thanks to your spark and the support of her family, Sanaya had the courage to use her new skills to open a tailoring shop. The income from her business would be able to help provide for her and her family.

#### A growing business

Over the last 6 months, Sanaya's shop has taken off. She has earned a total of 272,560PKR (£768.91) and is the best-performing shop from her cohort.

Her business has also become one of the main sources of income for her family. Even her brother, who previously was unemployed, has started working for her – running errands, going to the market

to buy materials and making deliveries.

#### Paving the way

Not only is Sanaya the spark of her family but she's also the spark in her community. She is an inspiration to the women in her village and is now passing on her skills and unlocking possibilities by teaching others how to sew.

Thanks to your support and Sanaya's determination, she is now paving the way in her community, and helping change mindsets on women's roles and their potential to be key earners in families.

### An interview with Mia

Meet Mia, she's part of our partner's team at Change Makers, based in South Africa. She supervises the Spark Projects and mentors young men, who are overcoming drug addiction, as they transition back into society and seek employment.

We had the opportunity to ask Mia a couple of questions about her work and why Spark Projects are so important for the young men she works with. We first asked her, what are the challenges that the individuals you mentor face?

She shared that.

66 the challenges might be financial or their commitment. 99

Due to limited employment opportunities, it can be difficult for these individuals to find jobs and stay resilient while living out their faith and new mindsets. That's

where Spark Projects can play a vital role in preparing the men as they find their pathway into employment.

Moreover, this is a critical time for the men as they transition back into society, because there is a high risk of relapsing into their old lifestyles.



Mia explained that

66 [Spark Projects] keep the good boundaries in place; they stay on the premises, which makes them stronger and ready to go back in the community. 99

We then asked Mia, how do you guide the men towards sustainable livelihoods?

We try to equip them to be stable and to support their families, to stand on their own two feet. We make them jobready.

For individuals who are particularly vulnerable and lack strong family support, Change Makers assist them as they navigate their reintegration. This includes offering 1-year apprenticeships or support with further education

Mia's role provides tailored guidance and mentorship so they continue to deepen their faith and build their independence.

Lastly, we asked her, what do you enjoy most about being a mentor?

For me, it's seeing when the guys start growing as people and then when they excel. Because when they first come to the centre, I'm the person they meet, so I get to see their journey right from the beginning.

A lot of the time, the guys coming from the streets have no hope and then slowly you see the hope grow and even their appearance changes. People talk about miracles, and I get to see them every day.

### Equip a Generation - Malawi



Just last month we began our work with Equip a Generation, in Malawi. Ten young women are receiving skills training and will be supported to join local businesses as interns.

They will learn skills according to their interests that will equip them to find employment or to set up their own enterprise.

Equip a Generation will be there to guide the young women, including how to present themselves with confidence, basics of setting up a small business, and managing money effectively.

### Bethanie Centre - Chad

Every child deserves a healthy start in life. However, for newborns in Chad who have lost their mothers during childbirth, their likelihood of survival is slim. Without the mother's milk, the young babies become seriously ill and malnourished.

The Bethanie Centre offers vital care for vulnerable newborn orphans and training for their carers in the name of Christ.

We teach the carers to process baby bottles with 3 containers: one for the empty bottle to be washed, one for disinfecting and one for rinsing. Pexplained Marceline,

the maternal assistant.

The babies stay with their carers at the centre until they have reached a safe weight and then return to their homes.

Our partnership with Bethanie is to improve the robustness and longevity of their service by establishing local income streams to support the high cost of formula milk.

By diversifying their sources of income, it will shift the organisation and service to a more sustainable footing, and ultimately, continue the vital care of vulnerable children for years to come.
